A city transformed by culture.

For much of the 20th century, Glasgow was known for its industry and ship building. But in the past few decades, the city has reinvented itself as a vibrant cultural **hub**. In 1990, Glasgow was named as the European Capital of culture, a turning point that marked its transformation from a post-industrial city to a **beacon** for creativity and **inclusivity**.

This wasn't just about building new museums or hosting festivals. It was about putting people, stories, and the arts at the centre of the city's future.

And today, according to the European Commission, Glasgow stands as the UK's top cultural and creative city.

World class museums and galleries.

If you love museums, Glasgow is paradise.

The city cares for the largest collection of civic museums in the UK outside of London. And bar London, these museums attract more visitors than any other city in the UK. Here are a few highlights.

The Kelvingrove Art Gallery and Museum. It's home to 8,000 exhibits from dinosaur skeletons to Salvador Dali's, Christ of St. John of the Cross. It is a must visit for art lovers and families alike.

The Burrell Collection. Recently **refurbished** and award-winning, this museum houses a stunning array of international art and **antiquities**, all thanks to the generosity of Sir William Burrell.

Riverside Museum. Winner of the European Museum of the Year Award in 2013, this striking building on the Clyde celebrates Glasgow's, transport and city life. The Gallery of Modern Art. Located just off George Square, it's a **hub** for contemporary art and creative workshops.

Music, the beating heart of Glasgow.

Glasgow is officially a UNESCO City of Music, the first in the UK. With around 130 gigs every week, music is **woven into the city's DNA**. From legendary Barrowland ballrooms to King Tut's Wah Wah Hut, Glasgow's venues have launched the careers of global acts like Oasis, Lewis Capaldi, Franz Ferdinand, Belle and Sebastian, and Primal Scream, just to name a few.

The city also hosts major music festivals including Celtic Connections. The world's largest winter music festival celebrating folk, roots and world music.

And TRNSMT a massive summer festival, attracting international acts and thousands of visitors every year.

National organisations like Scottish Opera, the Royal Scottish National Orchestra, and Scottish Ballet, all call Glasgow home and the Royal Conservatoire of Scotland is one of the world's top places to study performing arts, **nurturing** the next generation of talent. Theatre, dance, and performance

Glasgow is home to four of Scotland's five national performing arts companies, and its theatre scene is second to none. You'll find everything from grand productions at the King's Theatre and the Theatre Royal, to **cutting-edge** performances at the Tron and Tramway.

The city's creative spirit is also seen in its **grassroots** venues and community festivals, ensuring everyone has a chance to take part in the arts.

Nearly 90% of Glaswegians participate in some form of cultural activity every year, a **testament** to the city's inclusive, people-first approach.

Architecture and design.

Glasgow streets are a **showcase** of architectural **flair**. From Victorian grandeur to bold modern statements. The city is famed for the work of Charles Rennie Mackintosh whose Art Nouveau Designs can be seen in the Glasgow School of Art and the Willow Tea Rooms.

The city's mural trail and street art add a contemporary twist, turning everyday spaces into vibrant **canvases**.

Diversity and innovation.

Glasgow's cultural strength comes from its diversity. It's Scotland's most **ethnically diverse** city with festivals like Mela and others celebrating cultures from around the world.

The city's creative industries are **booming** with a strong **startup scene**, and a new generation of artists, designers, and musicians choosing to make Glasgow their home. A city that welcomes all.

Above all, Glasgow is known for its friendliness. Regularly voted as one of the world's friendliest cities, its welcoming atmosphere draws people from all walks of life. Whether you're catching a gig, exploring a museum, or chatting in a cafe, you'll find Glaswegians who are proud to share their city's story.
