The Edinburgh International Festival, or the EIF, was founded in 1947 in the aftermath of World War II with a powerful vision: to reunite people through great art and foster a "flowering of the human spirit".

The idea was **championed** by **cultural pioneer** Rudolf Bing, a Jewish **refugee** from the Nazi **regime**, **alongside civic leaders** like Lord Provost John Falconer and the British Council.

Edinburgh's ancient beauty, artistic facilities, and safe atmosphere made it the perfect home for this ambitious new event. Despite post-war austerity and rationing, the city rallied behind the festival with locals even donating their coal rations so Edinburgh Castle could be floodlit for the inaugural celebration.

The first festival featured classical music, opera and theatre, **drawing** artists and audiences from across Europe and quickly establishing itself as a **beacon** of hope and cultural **renewal**.

International collaboration

From the very beginning, the EIF has welcomed the world's finest performers in opera, music, theatre, and dance. Its commitment to artistic excellence and international collaboration remains at the heart of the festival, bringing together acclaimed artists and companies from around the globe.

Over the decades, the festival has expanded to include dance, visual arts, and contemporary music, commissioning new works and nurturing emerging talent.

The EIF is **renowned** for its curated invitation-only programme, ensuring a standard of quality that draws audiences and critics alike.
