Let's hear about some other Edinburgh festivals.

Edinburgh Art Festival.

Founded in 2004, the Edinburgh Art Festival is the UK's largest annual visual arts festival. It brings together exhibitions from **established** and **emerging** artists across more than 40 venues, including major galleries and unique public spaces. The festival **commissions** new works, supports Scottish and international talent, and offers free events, talks and tours, making world class art **accessible** to all. It's an **invitation** to explore the city and the creative ideas **shaping** our times.

Edinburgh Jazz and Blues Festival.

Since 1978, the Edinburgh Jazz and Blues Festival has brought the city to life with the sounds of jazz, blues, funk, and more. Over 10 days, more than 130 concerts take place in venues, ranging from grand concert halls to **intimate** clubs and outdoor stages. The festival **attracts** international stars and rising local talent with **highlights** including the free Mardi Gras and Carnival events that fill the city with colour and rhythm. It's one of Europe's largest jazz festivals and a must for music lovers.

Edinburgh International Book Festival.

Established in 1983, the Edinburgh International Book Festival is a haven for readers and writers alike. Held in Charlotte Square Gardens, it features author talks, panel discussions, workshops, and book signings with leading voices from Scotland and around the world. For two weeks, it transforms Edinburgh into the world's **literary** capital. The festival is known for its themed discussions on contemporary issues, **fostering** debate and **intellectual exchange** in a welcoming setting.

These festivals, alongside the Royal Edinburgh Military Tattoo and others, make Edinburgh's summer a truly global celebration of the arts. They bring together artists, thinkers, and audiences from every corner, turning the city into a **vibrant** creative hub. Yet for all their colour and creativity, Edinburgh's summer festivals aren't without **controversy**.

In recent years, there's been growing concern about the **soaring** cost of **accommodation**. Some flats now charge thousands of pounds for a stay in August, making it harder for performers and audiences to take part.

Many artists and visitors worry that the rising **expense** is putting the festivals out of reach for all but the wealthiest, risking a loss of **diversity** and **creative ambition**. There are also calls for better **accessibility**, as many venues remain difficult for disabled performers and audiences.

Funding cuts, pressures on public space, and **disputes** over how the festivals **impact** local life have all sparked lively debate about their future. **Supporters** argue that these challenges must be **tackled** head-on to keep Edinburgh's summer of culture open and inspiring for everyone.
